The Gospel John 2. 1-11

Alleluia, alleluia.

Christ was revealed in flesh, proclaimed among the nations and believed in throughout the world. Alleluia

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory be to thee O Lord

2 On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. 2 Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. 3 When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." 4 And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." 5 His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." 6 Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty

gallons. 7 Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. 8 He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. 9 When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom 10 and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." 11 Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

Reflection

The changing of water into wine is a remarkable but simple story that anyone can understand. Of course, there is a deeper meaning if we have the 'eagerness to search and the eye to see and the mind to understand.'

John's gospel has no parables, unlike Matthew, Mark and Luke. Rather, John writes about seven miracles which he calls 'signs' which alert us to probe more deeply than at face value. This water into wine was the 'first sign' which caused his disciples to believe in him and in which the 'glory', the splendour of Jesus, is 'seen'.

In Revelation, we read about the 'marriage of the lamb'. Figurative language in which the church is described as the 'bride' of Christ who is the Lamb of God. This idea is also in the Old Testament; God is described as the husband of Israel, wedded to them and the land. Both are images we understand, they embody deep commitment and love. But God's love, unlike our love which is so fickle, is strong, generous, unmerited love which seeks our response. As the hymn has it...

....From heaven he came and sought her To be his holy bride; With his own blood he bought her, And for her life he died.

Note how the water jars are filled to overflowing, no more can be added and there is no lack, it is the best wine. Every time we take bread and wine and give thanks for the saving death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we celebrate a foretaste of the 'heavenly banquet' which is really a picture of the total joy and fulfilment found in the presence of God, '...at thy right hand are pleasures for ever more.' (Ps 16)

It is suggested that the wedding Jesus attended was for a relative of Mary. She certainly appears to have been involved in the arrangements as she has some authority with the caterers. I can imagine her keeping a watchful eye, making sure everything is going to plan. To run out of wine would be a social faux pas, a catering catastrophe, which could even be the cause of a lawsuit if a disgruntled guest did not receive hospitality appropriate to the value of his wedding gift. Having told Jesus the problem she simply tells the caterers to "Do what he tells you".

The servants had to change their usual practice and do something different. To fill such large jars to the brim was hard work and no doubt they thought it madness. As the wine is drawn, the chief steward at the feast makes the rather bemused comment to the bridegroom that unusually, and perhaps stupidly, he has saved the best wine until the end.

I think it rather special that this 'sign' was performed at a wedding. A simple occasion of human happiness where there was good food, good company, much love and wine '...to make glad the heart of man'. It places Jesus's 'first sign' firmly embedded in human joy. We do not have a God far off and

distant, or too 'spiritual' to be involved with a birthday party, a pleasant walk, or simple pleasures with others.

Is it not sometimes true of us that only after we have tasted much of the 'cheap wine' of life that we are able to appreciate the best? God only offers the best all the time.

Jesus said "The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy;

I have come that they may have life and have it to the full." John 10.10

Two levels of hearing. We can listen lightly so that we are not challenged or have anything demanded from us. We don't need or want to hear anything new because we already know. We already have our mind made up. That feels 'safe'; we have made the world 'manageable'. We can filter what we hear and avoid what is too disturbing or painful. We can change the channel, defriend, switch off. Our level of hearing keeps our world superficial and small. It is difficult to recognise that in ourselves and hard to change.

To listen deeply is to risk being open and vulnerable – but it is also dynamic. It requires us to hold less tightly to 'my truth'. To come and fill our cup with new wine and drink. It is like opening a window in a stuffy room and feeling fresh air on our face. We can take a risk and pray and ask to see what we don't yet know, and go where we have never been, think new thoughts imagine possibilities never considered.

How might we begin to do this? Practically, Bible study with a commentary alongside is a good way to expand our knowledge. It is even better if we find a friend or a group to think through and discuss what we read. It helps increase awareness of the human condition and inform our political and societal understanding.

All the readings in Epiphany contain a revelation and require a response from us. To change, to go, to reach out, to love, to give, to forgive, to heal, to reconcile. It is an invitation not simply to believe a truth but to do the truth.

The Apostle John writes as an old man looking back over a lifetime of faith in Jesus Christ. He was at the wedding at Cana, at the foot of the cross, and a witness to the resurrection. In old age he writes letters to the young churches to teach and encourage them. They had never known Jesus in the flesh. John will tell them about the One whom he has seen and heard, touched and gazed upon and who has been present to him all his life. He will tell them:

That wherever Jesus went and whenever he came into a life,

it is like water turning into wine.

Not cheap wine, but rich and warming. This is the message of Jesus - that we are profoundly loved and welcomed into a joyous celebration of life that is greater than our circumstances.

Wine is to be drunk not stored in closed jars or bottles – this is its real and ultimate purpose. But drinking is something only we can do for ourselves.

The Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
maker of heaven and earth;
And in Jesus Christ his only Son our Lord;
who was conceived by the Holy Ghost,
born of the Virgin Mary,
